Drop to Add and Give Info

v3.1

For iTunes 11+/OS X 10.8+ Find more free AppleScripts and info on writing your own at Doug's AppleScripts for iTunes.

This script is a **droplet**. Drag audio files – or a folder containing audio files – to its icon in the Finder (or Finder Toolbar) and a multi-edit window will allow you to set many common tags before the script adds the files to iTunes, after which your tag info will be applied to the new tracks. Saves trips to iTunes when batchadding files. Additionally, tracks can be copied to a new or existing playlist.

Recommended for small batches of files, up to 20 or so; a very large batch of files may aggravate iTunes. You may be better off multi-editing tags in iTunes the conventional way after adding very many files.

Mac OS 10.8 or later only.

Installation:

Note: This script is a **Cocoa-AppleScript Droplet** and can be installed in any location to which you find it convenient to drag files.

Droplets can also be installed and accessed from the Finder Toolbar by holding the Command key while dragging the droplet to the Finder Toolbar.

How to use:

Drag audio files -- or a folder containing audio files -- to the **Drop to Add and Give Info** droplet's icon in the Finder. In a moment, a window will be displayed:

Enter the tag data that will be applied to each new track and put a check in the corresponding checkbox to use that text for the corresponding tag. (A blank entry with a checkmark will clear any info for that tag.) When finished, click the **OK** button. After the window is dismissed, the script will add the dropped files to iTunes and then apply the tags you entered.

When the droplet has finished, it will report how many of the dropped files were added.

• The script presumes that dragged files are not current iTunes entries. While you *could* re-add files from the "iTunes Media" folder iTunes *might* create duplicate entries by doing so. Results will be variable depending on your specific circumstances.

• To copy the new tracks to a playlist, checkmark "Copy new tracks to playlist:" and then select an existing playlist or enter the name for a new one in the text box.

• I hope to add back the previously available feature whereby existing metadata would be displayed as default tag entries. This feature was dicey in some operating systems.
